IS YOUR CAR READY FOR WINTER DRIVING?



From September 1st through May 31st, all vehicles operating on any roadway must be equipped with adequate snow tires or tire chains. Don't only rely on the 4-wheel drive; having adequate tires is essential.

Remember, you could be issued a citation if you get caught with improper tires. Do you know where that snowbrush/ice scraper is? After a storm, please clear the entire windshield and brush off the headlights and taillights!

Town of Snowmass Village Winter Safe Driving Tips

- 1

DRIVE SLOWLY - Slippery roads reduce the amount of traction your tires have, and winter conditions make it more difficult to control a vehicle. Always adjust your speed down to account for lower traction when driving on snow or ice.
- 2

ACCELERATE AND DECELERATE SLOWLY - Apply the gas slowly to regain traction and avoid skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry and take time to slow down for a stop and turns. Remember that tire traction diminishes on icy roads.
- 3

INCREASE YOUR FOLLOWING DISTANCE - Allow plenty of space between your car and other vehicles. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- 4

DON'T STOP IF YOU CAN AVOID IT - There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling.
- 5

DON'T POWER UP HILLS - Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads will just make your wheels spin. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed downhill slowly.
- 6

DON'T STOP GOING UP A HILL - There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.
- 7

STAY HOME WHEN POSSIBLE - Only go out if necessary. Even if you can drive well in bad weather, it's better to avoid taking unnecessary risks by venturing out.

North Rim Trail, Seven Star Trail, and Sky Mountain Park trails will be closed beginning December 1 to provide a peaceful place for wildlife to negotiate winter conditions. These trails will reopen on May 16.

UNDERSTANDING AND REDUCING WILDFIRE RISK IN SNOWMASS VILLAGE

The Town of Snowmass Village, in partnership with Roaring Fork Fire Rescue and the Wildfire Collaborative Roaring Fork Valley, is launching a cutting-edge wildfire risk modeling project to help our community better understand wildfire exposure—and take the most effective steps to protect our homes and neighborhoods.

What Is the Project?

At the heart of this initiative is a state-of-the-art tool called AGNI-NAR (Asynchronous Graph Nexus Infrastructure for Network Assessment of Wildland-Urban Interface Risk). Developed by Dr. Hussam Mahmoud—a leading wildfire risk expert and Director of the Vanderbilt Center for Sustainability, Energy, and Climate—AGNI-NAR offers a new way to model how wildfire can move through both landscapes and neighborhoods.

Unlike traditional wildfire models, AGNI-NAR uses graph theory to simulate how fires can spread from vegetation to homes—and from home to home. It accounts for factors like wind speed, ember travel, and evacuation pathways, making it one of the most advanced tools available for community-level wildfire risk assessment.

Why This Matters

With fire seasons growing longer and more intense, understanding local risk is critical. This model will help identify:

- Which homes or areas are most at risk
- How a fire might spread across the terrain and built environment
- The most effective mitigation strategies—like defensible space, building materials, and evacuation planning

This project is part of a broader regional effort by the Wildfire Collaborative Roaring Fork Valley, a partnership launched in 2022 to unite fire agencies, local governments, and community organizations in a shared strategy for wildfire resilience.

By combining science, collaboration, and on-the-ground action, we're working to protect what we value most—our homes, our community, and our future.

What's happening at the Little Red Schoolhouse?

- Expanding childcare capacity from approximately 25 students to approximately 65 students.
- Adding four new classrooms in an updated building.
- Improving playground and outdoor learning spaces.

Why expand access to childcare in Snowmass Village?

- Adequate access to childcare is an important component of thriving communities.
- In 2021, Town Council adopted a goal to “Explore an enhanced use of the Little Red Schoolhouse to provide an improved and enlarged childcare/early learning facility.”
- The existing childcare facility has exceeded its capacity and is currently on a waitlist.

What's the cost?

- Estimated Project Cost: **\$8,500,000**

Roundabout at Brush Creek & Owl Creek Roads

What's happening at this intersection?

- The proposed roundabout replaces the existing intersection and also includes pavement reconstruction, additional bus stops, pedestrian walkways, retaining walls, storm drainage, utility improvements, and multimodal trail improvements.
- This project improves the safety of the intersection for all users.

Why a roundabout?

- Improving this intersection with a roundabout improves its safety and functionality for all users - motorists, bicyclists, pedestrians, and transit services.
- This construction will allow the Town and its partner agencies to update critical underground utilities & other infrastructure.
- This intersection currently operates at a *failing level-of-service*. Safety is compromised during inclement weather, busy times of the year, and other operating conditions.

What's the cost?

- Estimated Project Cost: **\$8,500,000**

Why build housing at the Draw Site?

- The Town's Comprehensive Plan identified a need for **383 additional workforce housing units** to meet the demand.
- The **2021 Workforce Housing Master Plan** identified the Draw Site as a location for future housing.
- **In late 2022, the Council directed staff** to pursue development at the Town Hall Draw.
- During the November 2024 General Election, **Snowmass Village voters approved** a ballot question authorizing funding for the Draw Site project.

What's the cost?

- Estimated Monthly Rental Costs (not including utilities):
 - **Studio:** \$1,145 - \$1,445
 - **One Bedroom:** \$1,435 - \$1,735
 - **Two Bedroom:** \$1,650 - \$1,910
 - **Three Bedroom:** \$2,110 - \$2,660
- Estimated Project Cost: **\$71,770,164** (no new taxes)

How many units?

- **Total Housing Units:** 63
- **Total Parking Spaces:** 102

Transit Center

Why add a Transit Center to the Snowmass Mall?

- Combines **local & regional transit** in one location.
- Meets **current demand** - RFTA & Village Shuttle have dedicated spaces.
- Improve **transit users' experience** - adds restrooms and improves waiting areas.
- Improve **accessibility** and **welcome experience** to the Snowmass Mall.

How did we get to this point?

- **Over 40 years of public transit** planning and service.
- Support from **local, regional, and federal** transit partners.
- **Conceptual design & environmental assessment** completed.

What's the cost?

- The project is estimated to cost between \$40-60M, depending on design elements.
- Current funding structure:
 - Local sources: **\$9 million**.
 - Federal sources: **\$13.5 million**.
 - Approximate **\$20M funding gap** to be filled by a combination of local, state, and federal sources.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT PITKIN COUNTY WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS

Pitkin County is one of many partner organizations in the upper Roaring Fork Valley that prepares for and responds to emergencies when they take place. We recognize that planning for wildfires is an essential area of our work and assisting the community with awareness and preparedness information is key to our communal safety.

We hope that the information below helps you be as informed and prepared as possible. Being prepared before emergencies occur gives all of us the opportunity to respond and act more quickly.

When is wildfire season in Colorado?

Wildfires can happen year-round in Colorado, and you should always be prepared and informed; however, the greatest danger for wildfires is from May through September.

How do I sign up for real-time alerts for wildfire and other emergencies?

Please visit www.pitkinemergency.com and sign up for Pitkin Alert Notification System. Through this service you can receive alerts via text, email, and/or phone call on a variety of emergency topics, including evacuation notices.

How do I stay informed about wildfire conditions and emergency news in Pitkin County?

Please visit www.pitkinemergency.com. Bookmark this website as your one-stop site for emergency communications, updates, and resources.

Is there an app I can use for alerts?

Yes! Pitkin Alerts are now available through the ReachWell app. It's easy to sign up and you can get notifications immediately. Just download the app, allow notifications, add Pitkin County Alerts (and other nearby areas), and select your preferred language. You do not need an account, username, or password to use this app. Download Now: [Android](#) and [Apple](#).

What are wildfire restrictions or fire bans?

To limit the potential for human caused wildfire, Pitkin County utilizes three stages of wildfire restrictions or fire bans, which require changes in human behavior on public and private lands to boost prevention.

PITKIN COUNTY **STAGE 1** FIRE RESTRICTIONS

The first stage occurs when there is increasing fire danger and an increase in the need for preparedness. Stage I imposes relatively minor restrictions aimed at preventing the start of wildfires based on human activities that are known to be high risk, specifically restricting smoking, fireworks, and spark producing devices like welding, torches, and engines without spark arresters. In addition, campfires are only allowed in designated fire grates in developed recreation sites or private fire pits.

STAGE 2 FIRE RESTRICTIONS

As the risks increase, the restrictions increase in Stage II. This stage intensifies the restrictions from Stage I by focusing on activities that, although normally managed under permit or contract, have a relatively high risk of causing a fire start. They include all the restrictions in Stage 1 plus ban all open fires, charcoal grills, and off-road vehicles driving or parking off established roads or trails.

Stage III - Stage III represents a closure to public lands and impacted area. There are very high risks in this stage and closures are necessary when other mitigation efforts are not sufficient.

What is a red flag warning?

Red flag warnings are a weather forecast category issued by the National Weather Service to inform the public, safety officials, and land management agencies that conditions are ideal for wildfire combustion and rapid spread. These conditions typically include drought or dry conditions, low humidity, high or erratic winds, and the possibility of lightning. Red Flag Warnings also call for changes in behavior.

How can I prepare for an emergency evacuation?

Create an emergency plan, which includes locations and communications plans as well as several different evacuation routes if available. Don't wait to evacuate. Leave as early as possible. Do not linger once orders have been given. Keep your vehicle fueled. Have study shoes and a flashlight near your bed so you're ready for a night evacuation. Have your "go bag" always at the ready.

What should I put in my "go bag"?

Pitkin County has a [recommended list published here](#) and a link to the [American Red Cross' list](#). Essentials include water, non-perishable food, first aid kit, medications, wallet, irreplaceable items, small valuables you can carry, personal computers, extra eyeglasses and contact lenses, and charging devices.

How do I know what my evacuation zone is?



RESIDENTIAL COMPOSTING

The Town of Snowmass Village offers all residents residential composting free of charge. Containers for the home are available at Public Works and Town Hall and the public drop-off container is located at the Public Works facility at 3745 Owl Creek Road.

Small amounts of food-soiled paper and compostable packaging are acceptable, including pizza and paperboard take-out containers, Please tear pizza boxes and paperboard containers into pieces before composting.

Please, no styrofoam, waxed, or plastic-covered containers, glass, silverware, cans, bottles, or plastic bags. Garbage and recycling must be kept separate from food composting materials.

What you need to know about Snowmass Village's **Outdoor Lighting Code**

Why change the code?

- The Lighting Code revisions enhance the Town's character and livability, prevent non-compliant outdoor lighting, reduce lighting conflicts between property owners, prevent the increase of sky glow, and preserve the naturally dark sky for the benefit of residents, visitors, wildlife, and the environment.

What do I need to know?

- Passed by Town of Snowmass Village Council on September 2, 2025.
- All outdoor lighting must comply with the outdoor lighting regulations in Chapter 16A of the Town's Municipal Code.
- The Town has moved to measuring light by lumens rather than watts.
- All clear-lensed point light sources must be shielded. Any unshielded light source must use a non-clear, clouded material as the primary lens to reduce glare from the light bulb.
- The Town works on a complaint basis. The person complaining must identify themselves and submit a formal complaint in writing.
- All lighting trespass, seasonal lighting, curfew regulations, and curfew hours begin September 17, 2025.

SHORT-TERM RENTAL (STR) PERMITS

What are Short-term Rentals?

A short-term rental (STR) is a type of lodging wherein a dwelling unit, either in full or in part, is rented to a temporary occupant(s) for fewer than thirty (30) consecutive days. Often facilitated by peer-to-peer websites such as VRBO.com and AirBnB.com, short-term rentals are most commonly residential properties available for rent. A bed and breakfast is sometimes considered a type of short-term rental.

The Town of Snowmass Village requires hosts to obtain a business license and permit in order to offer a short-term rental as part of their property.

STR Permits

As the winter season approaches, please ensure that your Short-Term Rental Permit and Business License are up to date with the Town of Snowmass Village. We encourage all property managers and owners to familiarize themselves with our rules and regulations to avoid any violations.
